## Learning tools to get you on your feet

If you've found yourself in-between jobs or with some extra time on your hands, Bethlehem Public Library has got two new learning tools for cardholders that might be just what you need to move forward.

Pronunciator takes a personalized approach to make language learning work for you. Just select the language and topics you love, the skills you want to build and how much you want to study each day, and Pronunciator will build a personalized course just for you — in a matter of seconds. You can choose from more than 160 languages to learn, including American Sign Language.

JobNow by Brainfuse is a multi-faceted resource to help give you the competitive edge you need to re-enter the workforce. You'll find live job coaching, interview practice, resume templates and help, along with 24/7 access to local job resources. Brainfuse also offers tutoring and academic

support through HelpNow.
