PROGRAMS AND SPECIAL EVENTS

- The Beekman Boys packed the community room when they came by to discuss their latest book, "1802 Style."
- Popular children's authors Joe Bruchac and Bruce Coville each made a stop at the library to talk about their work.
- Jester Jim helped kick off summer reading with a smile.
- Use of digital magazines remains high among Bethlehem patrons, prompting the addition of a second service Flipster.
- Coffee and Conversation, co-sponsored by Bethlehem Senior Projects, Inc., serves a large local audience of older adults and others who find the Friday afternoon schedule convenient.
- We expanded our sewing programs to add quilting and more in response to the demand.
- Online registration makes it easy to sign up for programs.
- The free library WiFi at the town pool is used by many.
- We have added a number of special collection items underwritten by the Friends, including GoPro cameras, telescopes, metal detectors, additional musem passes and more.
- Paws to Read and Book Buddies continue to help school-age kids build reading confidence.
- Our 3D printer sees frequent use, and a donation of 3Doodler pens has inspired some fun teen programs.
- The library hosted its first candidates forum for those running for the board of trustees.
- Multiple cinema series remain popular with audiences of all ages.
- We maintain our community connections through school and assisted living outreach, Books to People, participation in community events, our annual blood drive, and our own community and volunteer fair.
- We continue to open up our meeting rooms to teens for group study before the January and June Regents exams, adding study break activities on some of the days.
- Monthly Listening Parties allow music lovers to explore their favorite artists in depth.
- A bicycle fix-it station and phone charging kiosk offer nontraditional services.
- Both of our longstanding concert series, Evenings on the Green* (summer) and A Little Sunday Music* (winter), draw large audiences each year. An ice cream social* during one of the summer performances is a huge hit with the community.
