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

2024-25 budget (continued)

A commitment to service

THE 2024-25 BUDGET supports Bethlehem Public Library's commitment to our community by investing in both the materials and the people that are at the heart of what we do.

OUR SPENDING ON MATERIALS remains steady as we continue to curate a robust physical collection while adding in-demand e-materials and digital audio-books. Our circulation topped 640,000 items last year, with no sign of slowing down. Although spending on DVDs and audiobooks on CDs is decreasing slightly due to reduced demand, those collections aren't going away. We understand that access is important, and with streaming platforms in constant flux, we intend to have an audio/visual collection you can count on for years to come.

THIS YEAR'S BUDGET sees increases in the personnel line following last year's salary negotiations that recognize the contributions of all employees in providing the high level of library service our patrons deserve. These adjustments, along with a five-year labor contract, have led to stability following a challenging period of rapid post-pandemic turnover. Our part-time staff are instrumental in the library's ability to be open for 12 hours a day on the weekdays, as well as weekends, and this budget allows us to bring their pay rate into parity with their full-time counterparts. We are also incrementally increasing our contribution to the family health plan as we recognize the impact of health care expenses. As a service-driven organization, we know that happy employees provide the best service, and we are working hard to encourage and facilitate a healthy work-life balance.

LAST YEAR WE SET OUT TO increase the number of programs we offered to library-goers of all ages – and we did! Attendance at our events tripled, going from just over 12,000 to nearly 37,000. This year, we're devoting even more of our budget to these opportunities to promote literacy, lifelong learning and entertainment.

OUR 2024-25 BUDGET also reflects an increase in interest income to help offset new expenses, with rates expected to remain high through the end of the year.

AS A LIBRARY, we are dedicated to providing our community the highest level of access and service, and we believe the 2024-25 budget will allow us to do that. On the ballot this year is a levy of \$4.59 million, which is 4.32% higher than last year, within the limit specified by New York State.





Library building proposal

Planning for the future

YOU MAY HAVE HEARD that the library is putting the final touches on an approximate \$35 million building proposal that has been years in the making. Many thoughtful hours have been dedicated to this process, beginning with the library's Master Planning Report, which was based on community feedback from surveys and focus groups before and after the pandemic.

WE HEARD YOU say that you valued the library's physical collection and desired more meeting and private study spaces of various sizes. Also high on the list of priorities was a desire for imaginative children's and teen spaces. The plan that will come before you in a public vote, expected in Fall 2024, balances all of these goals without sacrificing shelf space.

THE PROPOSAL WILL also include updates to the space based on real-world data that show how the library is actually being used. The current library building is more than 50 years old and hasn't had any changes to its footprint in that time, despite seeing more than double the circulation since it opened in the early 1970s. Our physical collection has also grown as much as it can within the confines of a set footprint, with our digital holdings almost doubling the number of materials

we can offer to borrowers. A busy library requires adequate staff to provide services, and our 70-plus employees are making the best of a space that was intended for approximately 20.

A LACK OF SPACE has also affected the programming we are able to offer. In recent years, we've had to turn families away from our story times and popular children's events due to exceeding the capacity of our large meeting room. Our programs in partnership with the Bethlehem Historical Association frequently reach the maximum reservation long before the actual event. This is why our building plan includes a

space that would more than double our capacity for large events. The largest configuration of the community room would be available primarily for library programs, but the adjustable nature of the space would allow more access for community groups requesting rooms that hold 30-35 people, which are currently in high demand and booked many months out.

OTHER STRUCTURAL CHANGES would improve accessibility by bringing the entrance closer to the parking lot and adding a dedicated curbside pickup and drop off service. The board has also chosen to invest in the sustainability of this community by pursuing a geothermal heating and cooling system. This would benefit the neighborhood by cutting down on mechanical noise and removing the need for unsightly rooftop units. Any building updates will be made while the library remains open to the public.

THROUGH ALL OF THIS, we plan to continue expanding our collection based on our increasing circulation, 30% of which is in digital materials. We know the physical collection is our bread and butter, even as we add new ways to borrow library items through Libby, Hoopla and Kanopy.

WE REALIZE THAT the scope of this building proposal is large – it is a once-in-50-years ask – and we have carefully considered what this community is looking for in order to put this plan together.
